# RELIEF UNITS SWAMPED BY NEEDY'S CALLS

## LIONS CLUB HEARS ABOUT CONDITIONS

Commissioner Hill and Mrs.  
Anna Powless Relate Big  
Gain In Number of Families  
Being Kept Alive.

Tremendous increase in the amount of assistance given needy families in the community by relief agencies in the past year was pointed out at today's luncheon of the Lions Club by E. B. Hill, county commissioner, and Mrs. Anna Powless, Social Service secretary.

Mr. Hill and Mrs. Powless emphasized that the relief work done by the county and by the Social Service was not duplicated in any respect. "A careful check prevents duplication," they said.

"The county has had the largest number of requests for money from its poor fund that it ever had," Mr. Hill stated.

### 100 Families Rely On Social Service Funds

"Whereas we formerly had about thirty families who required assistance for a period of about three months each year, we now have about 100 families who are kept alive by Social Service funds every month," Mrs. Powless said.

She explained that each family receives from \$8.50 to \$18 per month.

"We have about forty families of transients who have moved here recently, each family having from eight to eleven in it, and all these people are relying solely on Social Service support for their existence."

### Funds Lacking For Boulder's Own Families

"We haven't enough funds to take care, properly, of our own Boulder people, and yet we have these additional 'transients' who must be cared for," Mrs. Powless said.

She said the transients, in every case, were offered transportation back to their previous homes, but declined.

H. B. Millard was toastmaster at the meeting. Alfred Allen was chairman.

Mrs. Hurlbert Anderson, Mrs. Ed Nix and Mrs. Charles Quigley, representing the Legion Auxiliary, told of plans for Poppy Day and sang a "Poppy Day" song.
