# KU KLUX KLAN VISIT BOULDER SWEEPING THROUGH STREETS A MYSTERIOUS, SHROUDED MASS

Three hundred members of the Ku Klux Klan, nearly all of them masked, paraded Pearl street in automobiles Saturday night headed by a float which was illuminated by three torch lights. The parade consisted of sixty-three automobiles, most of them touring cars, and was joined as it passed by a number of cars containing Boulder members of the klan and the curious of the Saturday night automobile crowd.

Circulars, folded and wrapped with a rubber band, were thrown to the people on the streets by men standing in the float. The float was in white and carried the words "Ku Klux Klan." The circulars stated:

"Ku Klux Klan, 100 per cent American.

**WE STAND FOR**  
and are pledged upon our sacred honor to uphold the Flag and Constitution of our country.

**WE STAND FOR**  
Free Speech, Free Press, Free Public Schools, and Separation of CHURCH AND STATE.

**WE STAND FOR**  
the Purity of Womanhood and are Pledged to Protect and Defend the Sanctity of the Home.

**WE ARE "ANTI" NOTHING**  
save those principles which are un-Christian and un-American.

**WATCH US GROW IN BOULDER**

in the parade were painted over to prevent detection. Such practice is forbidden by law. Most of the members taking part in the parade were from Denver. A much greater number was expected. As a matter of fact, one man whose name rumor quite commonly connects with the Boulder klan, stated there were 143 cars in the parade, and was surprised when told that there were but sixty-three.

Local klansmen in ordinary civilian clothes patrolled Pearl street at the intersections of Twelfth, Fourteenth, and Fifteenth and possibly other corners for nearly an hour before the parade. Near these intersections were automobiles, some of them with drivers, who joined the tail-end of the parade. The patrolmen seemed impatient and anxiously watched the traffic.

The parade came from West Pearl and went as far east as Seventeenth. It turned south at this corner to Arapahoe and then went east, presumably on the way back to Denver. The parade was for the purpose of arousing local interest in the Boulder klan.
