BOULDER KU KLUX KLAN RODE THRU STREETS SATURDAY NIGHT AND DROPPED DOLLARS EN ROUTE

Six members of the Boulder Ku Klux Klan raided the meeting of the Salvation Army in front of the Ber- man billiard parlor on Pearl street Saturday night and after a speech by one of their members, in which the Salvation Army was endorsed, threw fifty half-dollar pieces onto the army drum. All of the Ku Kluxers were masked. Their appearance caused a large crowd to assemble.

This was the first public appearance of the klan in Boulder. Its members are unknown, tho rumor connects several Pearl street business men with the organization. A copy of the letter, that was presented the Salvation Army by the masked men, was furnished the Camera by Capt. John Z. Davis this morning. It read as follows:

Dear Sir:—

Believing in the tenets of the Christian religion as we do and backed by a desire to express 100 per cent Americanism in assisting those agencies engaged in uplifting work of a truly Christian character, we are making this donation to assist you in your local activities.

We hope that you realize that the

platform on which we work is one of 100 per cent Americans, standing for the strict obedience of the laws of the United States, complete respect for our flag and our country, national, state and local law enforcement, and the upholding and upbuilding of truly American institutions.

We are building up in these United States a body of citizens who are 100 per cent Americans, with the best interests of the United States at heart.

We remain,

A SERVANT OF THIS COMMUNITY, OUR FLAG AND OUR COUNTRY.

Boulder Klan No. 3, Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

Captain Davis stated this morning that he and his band were greatly surprised when the klan "raided" their open meeting. He wished the Camera to give public expression to his appreciation for their generosity. "Twenty-five dollars is a great deal of money to the Salvation Army at any time, especially at this time of the year," said Captain Davis. He declared that any time the Ku Klux wishes to repeat their performance of Saturday night they will be welcomed.

A. M. Stevenson Dead; Was A Former Leader Of Republican Party And A Noted Lawyer

Denver, Nov. 27.—Archie M. Stevenson, prominent as a national leader in the Republican party a few years ago, died here today after a short illness. He was 64 years old. Stevenson, for many years, had represented Colorado in national Republican conventions. In 1912 he insisted that the Colorado delegation to the Republican national convention in Chicago remain in the regular Republican convention and later was credited, according to associates in Colorado, by President Taft, with being largely responsible for Taft's renomination at that time. Mr. Stevenson was unmarried. He was taken ill last Thursday and his decline since that time had been rapid. Mr. Stevenson weighed 300 pounds when in health.
